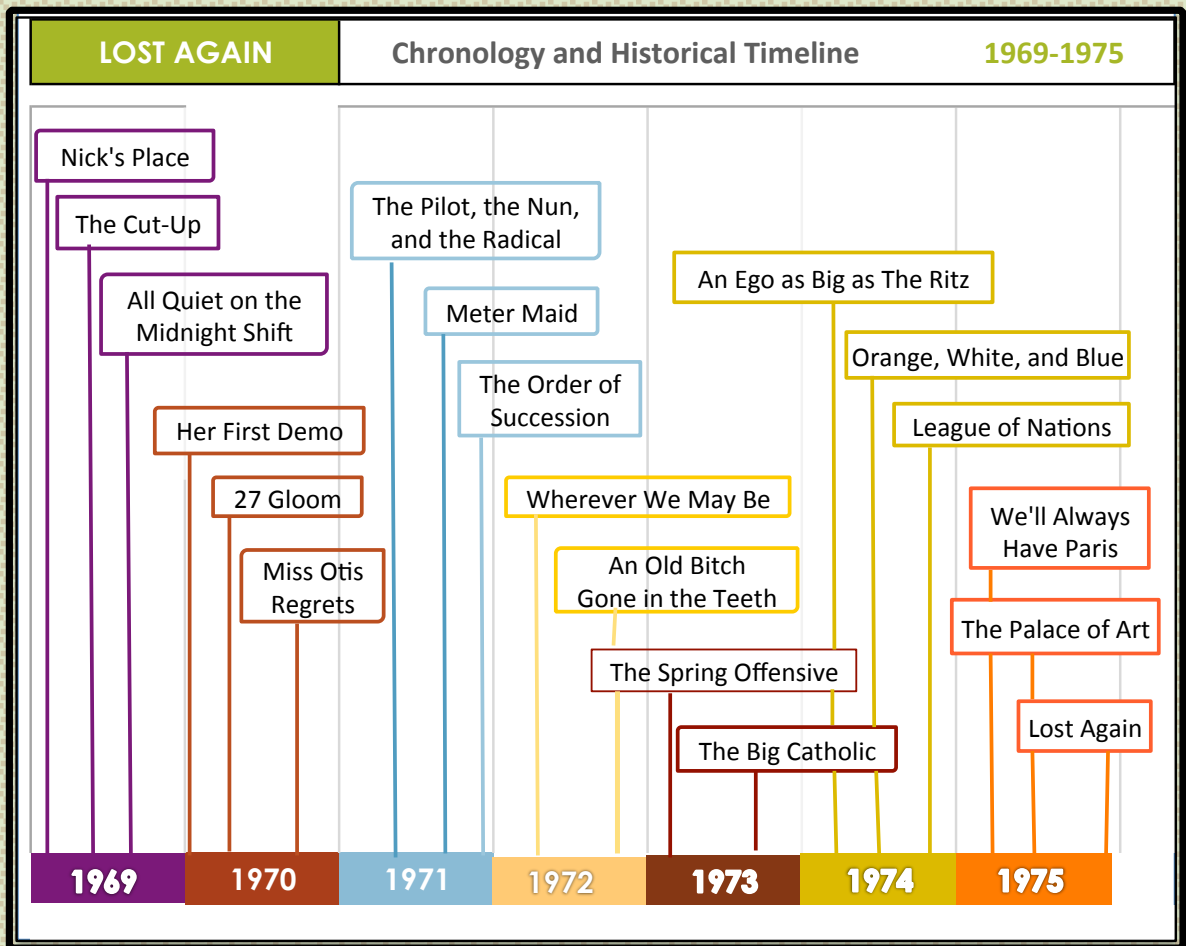

1969

July 20: Man walks on the moon.

August 17: Three days of sex, drugs, and rock 'n' roll end at Woodstock.

October 15: The First National Moratorium to End the War in Vietnam

October 16: The New York Mets win the World Series, their first.

September 26: The release of *Abbey Road*, the final studio album involving all four Beatles, dupes countless fans with more clues and sign that Paul McCartney has been dead since 1966.

December 1: Live broadcast of the first Vietnam draft lottery

1970

- February 14: David Mancuso gives birth to Disco at the Loft in New York City.
- February 19: Chicago Seven acquitted of riot conspiracy charges but found guilty of inciting riot.
- April 10: The Beatles officially break up when Paul McCartney announces he is leaving the group.
- April 22: Earth Day is celebrated for the first time across the United States.
- May 4: Ohio National Guard kills four students during a Vietnam War protest at Kent State.
- August 11: Convicted Catonsville Nine activist Daniel Berrigan, S.J., a fugitive and the first-ever priest on the FBI's "most wanted list," is apprehended.
- September 18: Jimi Hendrix found dead in London.
- September 21: Monday Night Football debuts on ABC.
- September 28: John Dos Passos dies in Baltimore, Maryland.
- October 4: Janis Joplin dies from a heroin overdose. Her final album, *Pearl*, is released 4 months later and peaks at number one on the Billboard 200, holding that spot for 9 weeks.
- October 14: FBI arrests Angela Davis at a Howard Johnson's motel in New York City.
- November 3: Massachusetts Democrat and anti-Vietnam candidate Robert Drinan, S.J., becomes the first Roman Catholic priest elected to Congress.
- December 2: Environmental Protection Agency [EPA] established.

**1971**

January 12: *All in the Family* debuts on CBS television.

February 10: Carole King's *Tapestry* released.

March 29: Army Lieutenant William Calley found guilty of 22 murders in the My Lai massacre.

April 9: Charles Manson sentenced to death.

June 7: Patent filed for PhoneMate 400S, the first home telephone answering machine.

June 13: The New York Times begins publishing *The Pentagon Papers*.

June 27: The Fillmore East closes in Manhattan's East Village.

July 3: Jim Morrison found dead in his Paris apartment bathtub.

July 5: The 25th Amendment lowers the voting age from 21 to 18.

September 9: A revolt breaks out at Attica State Prison.

October 1: Walt Disney World opens in Orlando, Florida.

1972

January 30: British soldiers shoot and kill 28 civilians in Derry, Northern Ireland on Bloody Sunday.

March 22: Equal Rights Amendment passes U.S. Senate and is sent to the States for ratification.

June 17: Five White House operatives arrested for Watergate burglary.

September 5: Palestinian terrorists kill 2 Israeli athletes and take 9 others hostage at the Munich Olympics.

November 1: Ezra Pound dies in Venice.

November 7: Richard Nixon is re-elected President, defeating George McGovern in a landslide.

**1973**

January 22: Supreme Court overturns state bans on abortion in *Roe v. Wade*.

February 27: Some 250 Sioux begin a 71-day occupation of Wounded Knee.

March 12: Frankie Frisch, the switch-hitting Fordham Flash enshrined in the Hall of Fame, dies at age 74.

April 3: Motorola's Martin Cooper makes the first handheld mobile phone call.

April 4: The World Trade Center officially opens in lower Manhattan.

April 8: Pablo Picasso dies at his home in France.

April 28: The Third Avenue Elevated Train, closed in Manhattan since 1955, ends service in the Bronx.

September 3: College students begin fall classes as a streaking fad sweeps campuses across the country.

September 11: President Salvador Allende of Chile allegedly commits suicide during a military coup that overthrows his socialist government.

September 20: Over 90 million TV viewers in 36 countries watch the "Battle of the Sexes" tennis match between Bobby Riggs and Billie Jean King.

October 10: Spiro T. Agnew resigns as Vice President of the United States.

October 17: OPEC embargo against Israeli allies triggers global energy crisis.

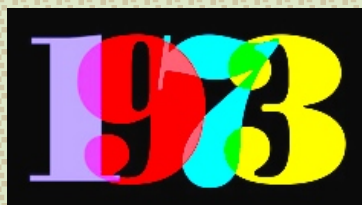
November 16: President Nixon signs the Trans-Alaska Pipeline Authorization Act into law, approving the construction of the Alaska Pipeline.

1974

February 4: Symbionese Liberation Army kidnaps Heiress Patty Hearst.

March 4: *People* magazine's first issue released with Mia Farrow in costume from *The Great Gatsby* on the cover.

June 26: The Universal Product Code is scanned for the first time at the March Supermarket in Troy, Ohio.

July 4: CBS airs the first Bicentennial Minute, narrated by Charlton Heston and sponsored by Shell Oil.

August 9: Richard Nixon resigns as President of the United States.

August 26: Charles Lindbergh, American aviator, dies.

September 8: President Gerald Ford pardons Richard Nixon.

September 16: President Ford offers conditional amnesty to Vietnam War draft dodgers and deserters.

October 13: Ed Sullivan, television host, dies in New York City.

October 15: National Guard mobilized to restore order in Boston school busing crisis

November 5: New York Democrat Shirley Chisholm becomes first African-American woman elected to Congress.



	March 15: Aristotle Onassis, the world's richest man, dies, bequeathing to Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, his wife of 7 years, \$250,000.		
	April 4: Microsoft founded by Paul Allen and Bill Gates.		
	April 30: South Vietnam surrenders as Saigon falls, ending the Vietnam War.		
	May 10: Sony releases Betamax in Japan.		
	August 25: Bruce Springsteen's <i>Born to Run</i> released.		
	September 14: Elizabeth Seton becomes the first American Roman Catholic saint.		
	September 18: Kidnapped Patty Hearst, aka Tanya, arrested for armed robbery.		
	October 11: NBC broadcasts first episode of <i>Saturday Night</i> . George Carlin hosts.		
	October 29: President Ford threatens to deny federal aid that would spare New York City from bankruptcy.		
	December 23: President Ford signs The Metric Conversion Act.
